## **FOCUS OF RESEARCH**

This research project, using both qualitative and quantitative data collection methods, focuses on women's economic empowerment and social protection projects in four Mekong countries: Cambodia, Lao PDR, Myanmar and Viet Nam.

It will involve an exploration of the gaps between the level of policy makers and intended beneficiaries in terms of their conceptions of the ideas of empowerment and security and their perceptions of what is happening on the "ground".

In addition, the research aims to specify under what conditions empowerment (as locally defined) and an increase in a sense of security (again, as locally defined) come as a result of economic empowerment and social protection projects, and under what conditions there seems to be no such apparent benefit - or even negative effects - in spite of the well-meaning intentions of the projects.

## **CONCEPTUAL FRAMEWORK**

One concern of this research is thus to understand gaps between project-driven goals and the actual needs, values and priorities of beneficiaries, with the aim of achieving sustainable forms of empowerment and security.

It also explores the question of whether benefits are more tangible or intangible to different stakeholders, and how communication between beneficiaries and policy makers might be improved.
